The opening of and ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new multisensory learning environment at Park School is scheduled for 4:30 today (Thursday) at the school, 828 Main St. "Katie's Corner," a therapeutic play and learning environment, is named in honor of Katie Springer Yenkin, a long-time volunteer at Park School. Yenkin's parents, Jerry and Micki Springer, previously purchased therapeutic equipment for Park School's sensory room, and this year granted Park School \$233,000 for the development and purchase of state-of-the-art equipment.

This equipment is interactive and may be used for therapeutic activities, such as reaching to activate, understanding cause and effect, following a sequence, color recognition and much more. Students will be evaluated by occupational and physical therapists to find the best means of integrating the equipment in Katie's Corner into Park School's curriculum.

Her essay is now among those that will be submitted for district recognition.

ETHS will induct six individual alumni and the 1953 swim team into the ETHS Athletic Hall of Fame on Wednesday. The program, open to the public, will begin at 7 p.m. in the high school's auditorium.

Honorees include: Tyrone Bell (1989) -- Football and basketball phenom at ETHS and Southern Illinois University; Charles Carney (1918) -- Football and basketball All-American at the University of Illinois, and outstanding basketball team captain at ETHS; Jeremy Hoff (1998) -- Volleyball legend at ETHS and in college; Meriam Bailey Leeke (1954) --"Pioneer" in golf at ETHS and at Northwestern University; Alyson Miller (1997) -- Quadthreat in basketball, softball, volleyball and golf at ETHS, and in basketball at Yale; and James T. Smith (1933) -- Track and cross-country legend at Indiana University; and the 1953 Swim Team -- ETHS's first swim team to win the state championship.

ETHS presents Writers' Showcase at 4 p.m. March 22, 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. March 23, and 8 p.m. March 24 in the high school's Little Theatre. This annual favorite is a showcase of literary and dramatic talent that brings to life the writings of ETHS student authors by student actors. Tickets, at \$4, are available at the door.

Kudos:

Three ETHS students -- Ben Simon, Elliot Damashek and Nick Salter -- were selected to present their research papers at the Loyola regional competition on March 3, one of 48 regional sessions held across the country and Puerto Rico, and in cooperation with the Department of Defense Schools of Europe and the Pacific. Damashek and Simon emerged as finalists, and Simon was named the overall winner -- the fifth ETHS student from Illinois to qualify for the JSHS national competition in the past eight years. Simon will present his work, which focuses on binary star-system stability in the presence of rogue stars, at the competition in May in Huntsville, Ala. Contestants also will attend the NASA Space Camp. If Simon wins at nationals, he will represent the United States at an international symposium in London, England.

Thirteen ETHS students qualified for the national Distributive Education of America competition by placing first, second or third in the Illinois state contest held March 1 through 3. Four students earned Top 10 finalist status in their contest categories. The national competition will be held in Orlando, Fla., later this spring.
