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## TO SEE OR NOT TO SEE

PUPPET MASTER: It was just a matter of time before Blair Thomas, founder and former co-artistic director of Redmoon Theater, turned out another puppet spectacle. An assistant professor in the School of the Art Institute's sculpture department, he also has formed the Puppetry Institute. Now, with assistance from the Cultural Affairs Department and the Chicago Opera Theater, Thomas and the students in the Gallery 37 puppetry job training class have created Master Pedro's PuppetShow.Originallycommissioned by a Spanish princess in 1923, Manuel de Falla's colorful puppet opera is based on an episode from Cervantes' masterpiece Don Quixote. The 30-minute work features three singers and an orchestra composed of players from the Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra. Performances continue through June 3 at the Storefront Theater, 66 E. CIRCUS TROUPE: Over the past five years, the Actors Gymnasium has helped others master the intricacies of the circus arts. Now it's time for a circus of their own. The new resident professional troupe, the Flying Griffin Circus, features faculty, friends and accomplished students from the Actors Gymnasium school. Highlights include high-wire work by Tony Hernandez and Lijana Wallenda Hernandez, puppet vignettes by Michael Montenegro and clowning by the Bumblini Brothers (Paul StubbingsandPaulKalina), whose act includes juggling fire. PROP FEST: New Play 2000, produced by Chicago's Prop Thtr in cooperation with the National New Play Network, continues with staged readings and workshop performances of 10 plays. The New Play Network is a consortium of 13 theaters around the country that are dedicated to producing new, provocative works.
