

A world premiere musical adaptation of Jane Austen's novel with a book, music and lyrics by Tony Award-nominated Paul Gordon. Barbara Gaines directs an ensemble headed by Sharon Rietkerk as Elinor Dashwood and Megan McGinnis as her wildly romantic sister. With scenic design by Kevin Depinet and lush period costumes by Susan E. Mickey ("The Madness of King George III").

## "SIDE MAN"

Warren Leight's Tony Award-winning 1998 play weaves the dissolution of a family and of the journeyman jazz player's way of life into a moving memory play narrated by Clifford (Michael Mahler), the only son of Gene (Michael Ehlers), a jazz trumpeter, and Terry (Kae Buddeke), his alcoholic wife. Jonathan Berry directs the ensemble, which includes Joe Foust, Ed Kross and John Gawlik.

Director Kimberly Senior puts her unique stamp on TimeLine's Chicago premiere of this timely quasi-mystery-thriller about an Iraqi museum curator's desperate plan to save his country's irreplaceable antiquities, especially the only remaining statue of the ancient mother goddess of the title. Set in a London hotel room where he has fled with his arranged bride on the eve of the 2003 U.S. invasion, the play also concerns the plight of women in his homeland.

Melanie Marnich's luminous "These Shining Lives" was a hit for Rivendell Theatre in 2008. Now Northlight has turned the based-on-fact drama about the women sickened by their jobs painting watch faces for Chicago's Radium Dial Co. in the 1920s into "Shining Lives: A Musical" with a book and lyrics by Jessica Thebus, who also directs, and music by Andre Pluess and Amanda Dehnert. Johanna McKenzie Miller plays Catherine, the narrator, who leads the women's efforts to fight back with a lawsuit.

Of all the reasons to catch the world premiere of "Moby Dick," adapted from Herman Melville's novel and directed by ensemble member David Catln ("Lookingglass Alice"), two stand out. It's produced in association with the Actors Gymnasium, guaranteeing lots of acrobatic pyrotechnics, and the incomparable Christopher Donahue is making a rare Chicago appearance as Capt. Ahab.

If you missed artistic director Sean Graney's epic four-part mashup of all 32 surviving Greek tragedies last year, be sure to see the reprise this summer with the original cast. Designed to be a contemporary Dionysian festival, the weekend performances of "All Our Tragic" last 12 hours, but there are frequent breaks, and food is included in the ticket price. Last time around, Part 1 featuring Walter Briggs as an oh-so-human Herakles on a quest to become a hero was especially enjoyable.

You don't have to be a Chekhov aficionado to appreciate the Chicago premiere of this 2013 Tony Award-winning play. Playwright Christopher Durang puts characters, scenes and themes from the Russian master in a "blender" (his word) and whips up a contemporary confection about gloomy half-siblings, the self-absorbed movie-star sister who threatens to sell their home, her boy toy and, yes, a cherry orchard.
